



Purpose: It is the goal of the Middle School Team to promote positive behaviors in order for students to be as successful as possible. These positive behaviors align with Cassell School's vision of being respectful, responsible, safe, and kind at all times.

Positive Behavior Incentive System

- Student Incentive Record: Student will carry a sheet for the month in their planners to all classes. The goal is to keep the sheet "clean" each week to be on GOLD for the following week.
- Students are given a total of 100 points per week (20 points per day).
 Expectations are broken into five categories, and a student will have four points in the following categories (aligned with the student handbook):
 - Demonstrate respect and kindness to others and property.
 - Come prepared for class.
 - Remain focused and work throughout the period.
 - Demonstrate respect by using the number system to ask permission.
 - Follow all directions by all faculty.
- If a student is unable to follow a certain expectation, "one point" will be taken from them by a faculty/staff member. Please note: no warnings will be given.
- Based on weekly averages, students will earn a gold, silver, or bronze level.

Student blue cards with daily records of behavior can be found in the student planner. Please ask your child for their blue card regularly as that is our main communication with parents regarding middle school expectations in all classes.

As an effort to teach independence and preparation for high school, students on Bronze will email their parents and all teachers to explain how they earned Bronze and what changes they intend they make so it does not occur again. Parents who have guestions may reach out to their child's homeroom teacher

Consequences

- Loss of privileges (including Gold/Silver status privileges, chromebooks, free time)
- Unable to participate in after school, Cassell-sponsored extracurricular activities or Cassell sports practices, games, for the following week - this includes any playoffs or championship games
- Increased supervision while on school property (front of the line, seat changes as needed)
- Independent lunch and recess (supervised)
- Adult supervised bathroom visits (adult will remain in the hall, emergencies will be handled as needed)
- If most or all tallies are related to missing classwork/homework, students must attend the Wednesday homework help sessions
- Loss of Honor Roll status regardless of grades for that quarter

 3rd Bronze offense in one school year: Meet with administration
 4th Bronze offense in one school year. MTSS behavior plan

<u>Missing work?</u> When a student is absent, there will be a missing assignments sheet in their mailbox. The student needs to make up the assignment within two days. After two days, points will be deducted. Absent work is not provided to students in advance.

Msg will show up for the assignment in ASPEN until the assignment is turned in. Grading Categories and Weights: Exit=5%: a short assignment that is given to conclude in-class work (Exit work **can not** be made up if absent.);

Formative = 65%: classwork, homework, quizzes, research, and mini-labs; Summative = 30%: Exams and full project conclusions. Gradebook codes: Msg=missing, Exc=excused, Inc=student still working, 0=actual grade on assignment. The students will be using the scientific method and design process while actively engaging in our middle school program: Science Career Adventures and a variety of other lessons, labs, and activities.

8th grade students: Science Fair: 8th grade students will start the year practicing measurement and the steps of the scientific method. The 8th grade science fair will be held in December.

Welcome back! Once again, our school theme is LEGO- Loving Every Growth Opportunity. Our ultimate goal this year is to have every student engaged in reading, in and out of school. We will be encouraging that growth in many different ways during the school day and hope you will continue the growth opportunity at home.

Homeroom Procedures (for 119 students):

Breakfast is served at 7:45, please enter the rotunda doors. Otherwise, line up at the door closest to Homan Ave. Entry is at 8:00 sharp! Dismissal is out the same door at 3:00. Remember phones are not allowed on campus. All staff are trained to confiscate any phone that is visible on school grounds and send it to the office for a parent to pick up. More information will follow via email regarding graduation, trips, and 8th Grade contracts so please make sure your email is always updated in Aspen with Mrs. Pienta or Ms. Rau in the main office.

Curriculum:

Our Balanced Literacy block consists of vocabulary, sustained silent reading, and lessons based on Common Core Standards. Students will be reading books in our class independently on a daily basis. We will be encouraging them to continue their reading at home each night. Our class library is full of young adult literature, some of which may touch on sensitive subjects or may have curse words. The students are encouraged to borrow books from us, but if this makes you uncomfortable, please feel free to escort your child to the Chicago Public Library, Bookies, or Half Price Books and choose a book together. The rest of the curriculum will be a mixture of Greek and Latin Affixes, comprehension, fluency, and responding to literature. The consumable text, *My Perspective* and novels will be used to facilitate these skills along with the computer based program, IXL.

Grading:

The school wide system is on a 10 point scale: 90-100 is an A, 80-89 is a B, etc. Aspen will be updated weekly and needs to be monitored by a guardian and the student. Various assignments will be evaluated with a grade using a point system: i.e. a journal entry may be worth 5 points and the student might earn 4 out of the 5 total points. As a schoolwide initiative, a proper heading is mandatory for work to be graded. Also, there are no individual extra credit opportunities, so please encourage your child to do their best and hand in all work on time throughout the entire quarter. A code of "Msg", with a value of zero, will show if there is missing work due to any reason. Absent work needs to be completed within a couple days upon return and late work will be accepted for reduced value up to 2 days late.

Grades will be calculated using these categories: Assignments, Discussions - 40% Tests, Quizzes, Projects - 50% and Group Collaboration - 10%

Homework

Time will be allocated during each period for free reading and occasionally a grade will be given for the engagement of this activity. We expect every student to continue reading at home every night for at least 20 minutes. Some students can keep track of their free-read book well enough to take it to and from school to read. However, other students find it easier to keep one book at school and one at home. Please help your child figure out the best routine for them. Homework assignments will consist of nightly reading, weekly IXL assignments, and occasional assignments that will enhance the standard we are working on in class.

Agendas and Absent Work:

Agendas are provided by the school and are a great tool for organizing. Homework is written in every room on the homework chart. If your child is absent, please know there is a secretary in every room keeping track of what they missed and what needs to be completed and handed in. This information along with any worksheets will be placed in their mailbox. Any tests missed due to absence will be on my front board and the student is responsible for finding time to make them up.

Curriculum:

Our math series we will be using is called Glencoe Math! Glencoe Math is designed to fully address the Common Core State Standards. Within each unit, concepts are organized into chapters that align to clusters and build connections among the individual standards.

IXL:

We will also be using a website called IXL. IXL is a comprehensive learning program offering unlimited math practice across thousands of skills-all which are aligned to the common core standards that aligns directly with our Glencoe Math textbook used in class daily.

IXL provides a personalized learning experience, while motivating students through challenge, competition, exploration, and reward. It allows students to explore new topics and strengthen math skills using interactive practice and examples.

One of the best things about IXL is that your child can access it from home. Please encourage your child to share their progress with you. Recommendations are assigned on Thursday's and due the following Tuesday each week. Those recommendations are aligned with the lessons in our textbook. Students are to aim for a smart score of 80 or higher.

Please note* those assignments are able to be redone to earn a higher score. Encourage your child to persevere in problem solving and mastering each of those skills. Mastery of these skills will improve a student's overall success in the classroom.

Also, ask your child to see any tests or quizzes to earn a bonus of 3 percentage points upon a parent signature

The program is adaptive and will adjust based on your child's demonstrated understanding of the material. All of your child's results will be saved, so you can monitor their progress anytime by clicking on Analytics tab. Students should allow about 20-30 minutes per recommendation.

For on-the-go practice, you can download IXL's free mobile apps for Apple, Android, or Kindle and sign in with your child's username and password. I hope you'll encourage your child to use IXL regularly, I look forward to a year of working together to make learning fun!

Homework:

Homework assignments will be written in student planners. It is the student's responsibility to have their planner every day and utilize it as a tool to stay organized. Expect 20-30 minutes of Math homework every night. Daily homework assignments will be from the student textbook, as well as their weekly IXL assignments. Students will have to keep track of their weekly IXL homework aka "recommendations" themselves. Reminders will be given on Mondays that all weekly IXL assignments are due the following day.

First Quarter we will focus on the following:

- Ratios and Proportional Relationships: Ratios, Rates, Fractions, Decimals and percent's.
- The Number System-Integers, Factors and Multiples, and Rational Numbers.

7th Grade: MS. Byrnes & Inclusion teacher Mrs. Roche

- Ratios and Proportional Relationships: Ratios and Proportional Reasoning, & amp; Percent's.
- The Number System: operations with integers and rational numbers.

8th Grade: Ms. Byrnes & Inclusion teacher Mrs. Snyder

- Real Numbers, Exponents, and Scientific Notation.
- Expressions and Equations: Equations with one and two variables.

*7th and 8th graders should have purchased a calculator during registration for use at school and for home

use.

Calculators are available for purchase from the main office for \$15. Please feel free to contact me if you have any questions.

Planners and Absent Work:

Daily Planners are provided by the school and are a great tool for organizing. Homework is written in every room on the homework chart. If your child is absent, please know there is a secretary in every room keeping track of what they missed and what needs to be completed and handed in. This information along with any worksheets will be placed in their mailbox. Junior High Students are responsible for making up any activities or assignments missed due to an absence.

Daily planners are also a great way for teacher-student-parent communication. Please ask your child for their blue card regularly as that is our main communication with parents regarding middle school expectations in all classes.

Grading:
